

The Fort Moultrie vignette was featured on two Bank of the State of South Carolina notes; the 1862 fractional 50 cent and 18xx 4 dollar note with Robert Hayne and Landon Cheves. The completed application and supporting documents for the 2017 scholarship must be received no later than <u>December 31, 2016</u>. Do not wait until the last minute to apply for this special program.

Are you a notaphilist? (Definition: a person who studies or collects paper money.) In the last issue of the <u>SCanner</u> I reported on the many changes planned by the Government and the Bureau of Engraving and Printing (BEP) to our existing bank notes. These changes are not being initiated until the year 2020 but this should not stop the young collector from collecting bank notes right now.

If you are just starting or are considering starting to collect bank notes here are some things to know.

You can get bank notes for your collection from circulation at face value.

Study about collecting currency before you buy notes.

Like coins, bank notes' value can depend on several things. The condition of the note is considered. Bank notes have a grading scale just like coins. The rarity of the note is important. The age of the currency may or may not affect the value of the note.

Star notes can be prized by collectors because they are more uncommon than regular note. A star note has a STAR (*) in the prefix or suffix position of the serial number. These notes are used to replace a note damaged during the printing process to maintain the correct count of notes in a serial number run.

A Currency Error is any note that does not meet the minimum quality standards of the BEP but still somehow manages to escape being removed during the many human and mechanical inspections. These errors include; cutting errors, folding or tears, inking errors missing prints, etc. Errors can be minor and worth very little premium but major errors can be worth significant money.

A category that is getting more popular is the Fancy or Interesting Serial number. Examples of these numbers include solid numbers (A99999999A); radar notes which read the same forward and back

(A12344321A); 6-7 same digits (A33333365A, A44444442A); low or one digit notes (A00000005A, A00000016A); special numbers A00001776A, A19970000A); ladders (A12345678A, A87654321A). Basically, any strange or unusual serial number combination could be collectable and worth more than face value.

Some other notes you may find in circulation and worth more than face value are Silver Certificates (blue seal), HAWAII notes (brown seal with HAWAII overprint), North Africa Silver Certificates (yellow seal), and United States notes (red seal).

Did you know that banks are required to remove damaged, heavily worn and obsolete notes from circulation, return them to the Government to be destroyed, and receive new notes to replace the bank notes returned to the BEP? Now is the time to start checking your bank notes as well as your coins.

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Three Proof Halves, Three Starting Points

For much of the twentieth century, plus these first two decades of the twenty-first, the biggest circulating coin we have had is the half dollar. Yes, the golden dollars are bigger in denomination, but the halves are the biggest in terms of sheer size. And yes, the fifty-cent piece doesn't get used nearly as much as the quarter does – certainly not today. But half dollars have been pounded out for a long time. Collecting them can be fun, but also may prove to be a bit daunting, at least at first. A person might wonder where to start, what to focus on, and how much to spend (of course!). While there are plenty of ways to start, let's suggest a beginning that is only three coins deep. But they're all proofs, and thus they are all beautiful. Here's what we mean.

The 1964 Proof Kennedy Half Dollar

The Franklin half dollar series came to an abrupt end when our nation's 35th president was assassinated on November 22nd 1963





during a trip to Dallas. As a means of honoring a young, vital president who had stood tall during what we now know as the Cuban Missile Crisis, our fifty-cent pieces were quickly redesigned, and the image produced by Mr. Frank Gasparro remains with us today. The number of proof Kennedys produced in 1964 is just under 4 million, which means they are still rather common for today's collector. And one wonderful aspect of a large mintage for any proof coin is that it usually translates to small prices when it comes time to buy. This is certainly true of the 1964, which costs only about \$30 in a grade as high as PF-67. This is definitely one good starting point for what can become a collection of great halves.

A Proof Franklin Half Dollar

It was Mint Engraver John Sinnock who designed the Franklin half dollar, although he passed away in 1947, just before its unveiling in 1948.

At the outset, there were no proofs at all for this fifty-cent piece, or for any of the other circulating coins of the U.S. for that matter. Proof coinage had been suspended in 1942 and did not resume until 1950. In what proved to be a fascinating time in numismatic history, proof coins in the Franklin half series went from

being relatively scarce in 1950 – with 51,386 produced as part of proof sets – to positively common by 1957 – the year that the 1 million proof mark was surpassed. What this translates to for the



collector today is a series of proofs that have several very affordable dates, and a smattering that are not. Every date from 1957 through to the end of the series in 1963 can be obtained in a grade such as PF-65 or PF-66 for no more than \$50. For most of us, that's a very affordable proof. It's also one of three coins that can become part of the trio we mentioned. Some of the older dates though, including the 1950 an the 1951, will cost significantly more. A patient collector might find one in the low hundreds of dollars, but that price is probably for a piece that has had some misuse in the past decades, such as a PF-63 example.

A Proof Walking Liberty Half Dollar

The Kennedy and Franklin fifty-cent piece series each have

proof coins that just about any collector considers inexpensive. Thus they are the easy 2/3rds of the trio we are assembling. Moving back to the Walking Liberty half dollars entails a step up though, no matter how we look at it.

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Proofs were issued from the Main Mint in Philadelphia each year from 1936 to 1942, and at the time were probably made in large enough numbers to fill the existing demand. But that demand has soared in the past thirty years, as the number of collectors has grown. And that means some higher price tags for these high-end coins today. But don't let that fact get in the way if you have your heart set on a proof Walking Liberty half. Simply start at what we might call the low end – for prices, that is – and look at what the possibilities are. As this is being written, a quick tour of eBay turns up some 1942 Walking Liberty halves in the lower proof grades for about \$500. If you have never spent more than \$50 on any coin in your collection, well, adding a zero to the figure is a bit of a sticker shock. But if you are willing to save up, a proof Walking Liberty might just be a fifty-cent piece that can serve as a crown jewel for a growing collection.

From here?

From these three starting points a person can build some amazing collections. If the just-mentioned cost of the Walking Liberty half is too rich for our taste, why not see about assembling a date run of just the proof Kennedy halves. The 1964 was rather inexpensive, and the more recent ones cost even less, even those with silver in them, issued from 1992 to the present. Or why not see if there are other proof Franklins beyond just a single example that we might call inexpensive? We mentioned that the 1957 – 1963 zone is quite affordable. Why not see just how far back you might be able to push it?

As we mentioned at the outset, there are plenty of ways to start collecting gorgeous half dollars. Why not enjoy building your own collection of glittering halves?

Proof (PR)

A coin usually struck from a specially prepared coin die on a specially prepared planchet. Proofs are usually given more than one blow from the dies and are usually struck with presses operating at slower speeds and higher striking pressure. Because of this extra care, Proofs usually exhibit much sharper detail than regular, or business, strikes. PCGS grading service recognizes Proofs (PR) as those struck in 1817 and later.

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HIDING IN THE GRASS: COPPERHEADS AMONG US

During the Civil War, a Democratic opposition to the conflict divided the North. A group of Southern sympathizers known as the "Copperheads" established its presence politically and would impact the country's social conscience for many decades with its criticism of the Lincoln administration and the policies of war.



The disparaging term "Copperhead" was given to members of the movement by Union Loyalists intent on likening them to a particular venomous snake. The Copperheads, however, embraced the term and displayed solidarity by wearing lapel pins and badges of Lady Liberty cut out from unpopular and

cumbersome Large Cents, which had only recently been replaced by the

much more practical Flying Eagle and Indian Head Cents.

These 'Peace Democrats' were perceived as weak by the pro-Union Republicans of the day for seeking armistice with the Confederacy. In the decade leading up to the Civil War, these same Southern sympathizers had been referred to as "doughfaces." This term was generally applied to Northern



Democrats who were ideologically more aligned with Southern Democrats. They were said to be weak and timid men who were 'scared at their own dough faces.'

Due to the loss of the Southern market and the Mississippi River's closure to trade, Illinois was hit especially hard economically. The effect this had on tumbling grain prices was detrimental to the stagnant Midwestern economy. Adding fuel to the fire were the banks in the region that issued paper money based on Southern bonds. For Illinois Democrats, a break with Union ideals was not so much a statement of disloyalty, but rather a stance based on economic necessity. Still this did not prevent local newspapers from painting the peace-seeking movement as traitorous.

Party politics became so divisive in Illinois that top Democrats were accused of being members of the Knights of the Golden Circle, a like-minded group conspiring against the Union. Toxic rumors linking the two groups persisted, but no connection was ever proven. As Peace Democrats gained control of the State legislature in the 1862 fall election, the 'Copperhead Legislation,' as it came to be known in Illinois, seemingly was handed a mandate to oppose the war and the Union efforts. This victory was short lived as Republican Governor Richard Yates dissolved the Legislature on a technicality. Once again, Copperheads were forced to meet secretly.

Similar incidents were occurring in other pockets across the country. In Ohio, Congressman Clement Laird Vallandingham had been arrested for being a Confederate sympathizer. Also arrested was William Carlin, the son of a former Illinois Governor, who spoke out against the implementation of martial law. In addition, a number of cases were made against Northern citizens who encouraged desertion from the Union Army.

By 1863, it was believed that such men were actually a greater threat than Confederates. You could see the latter coming, whereas Copperheads were disguised as neighbors, shopkeepers and fellow church members who might lie 'in the grass' waiting to exploit a Northern weakness.

The choice of which snake to use in classifying these individuals would prove to be thought out thoroughly. Let us take a look for a moment at another venomous snake, the rattlesnake. The Gadsden flag of 1775 portrayed a rattlesnake with the ominous warning "Don't Tread On Me." Also, in his famous 'Join or Die' woodcut, Benjamin Franklin used a rattlesnake as a symbol of unity. The thinking being that the single cells making up the rattle emit no sound individually but make a feared and recognized sound when all are working together in unison. Furthermore, a rattlesnake usually does not strike unless threatened, although once provoked it rarely surrenders. For all of these reasons, the rattlesnake was a perfect Revolutionary symbol of unity between the colonies. By contrast, a copperhead was a more appropriate choice for these Civil War-era dissenters because that snake can lie dormant and offers no warning before striking. This is how Peace Democrats were viewed at the time by the largely pro-Union North.

Declaring oneself a Copperhead was seen as an act of treason. For this reason, secret meetings were held where members would feel safe to proudly wear the aforementioned lapel pin that defined the movement with Ms. Liberty displayed ever so prominently. One poem of the day went:

The traitor our Common Cents mars,
And on Liberty plainly he wars,
Taking Freedom away from the Union, I say,
When he cuts out her head from the stars.

SCNA AUSTIN M. SHEHEEN, JR. YOUNG NUMISMATIST SCHOLARSHIP

Applicants for the Austin M. Sheheen, Jr. Young Numismatist (YN) Scholarship must be a member in good standing of the SCNA. The applicant must be between 13 and 17 years of age. Previous SCNA Scholarship /Educational Grant Awards recipients are not eligible.

SCNA will decide each year what amount and number of scholarships are to be offered the following year conditioned upon funds being available for the scholarship. The local coin clubs can decide if club funds can be contributed to the SCNA scholarship winner(s).

YNs will be judged on their contributions to their local coin club, the SCNA and their accomplishments in school, religious institution or community activities.

The applicant must write a letter of self-nomination stating the reason(s) he/she would like to attend an ANA Summer Seminar. Also, the applicant must have at least 2 nominations with one being from a local coin club member or SCNA member who personally knows them. The other nomination should be from a school professional, religious institution or community leader who is involved with the nominee in one or more of these activities. Nominations should describe the applicant's contribution to the group. Any questions about the nominating procedure should be directed to the SCNA Secretary.

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A Union victory seemed all but inevitable at the start of 1864, and the Copperhead movement began to lose steam. Lapel pins were scarcely found and talk of dissent lessened. Governor Yates, seeking re-election later that year, continued his witch hunt for Southern sympathizers and found a willing ally once again in the newspapers of the day. Rumors were spread telling of Copperhead plans to free 7,500 Rebel prisoners held at nearby Camp Douglas. There were even newspaper articles warning against the creation of a Northwest Confederacy. With the advantage of hindsight, historians today believe this was all part of Governor Yates' plan to create a straw enemy to strengthen his re-election efforts.

These Copperheads can be viewed as treasonous conspirators or as concerned citizens exercising their patriotic duty to fight for civil liberty and free speech. In that sense, this argument is timeless and will never be successfully debated to a conclusion.
